Delta Dental of North Carolina Unveils New Water Bottle-Filling Station at Local Elementary School to Encourage Children to Drink More Water to Improve Oral, Overall Health

Delta Dental's Rethink Your Drink initiative is funding new water fountains in 23 schools across the state in an effort to improve oral health among children

Charlotte, NC (October 8, 2019) – On Monday, Delta Dental of North Carolina unveiled a new water bottle-filling station at Winget Park Elementary School. The floss-cutting event, attended by students and teachers, is part of the Delta Dental Foundation's <u>Rethink Your Drink: Water's School at School program</u>. The initiative aims to encourage children across the state to drink more water and fewer sugar-sweetened beverages, which can lead to oral health issues such as tooth decay and cavities.

Winget Elementary was one of 23 schools that received a new water bottle-filling station through a grant from the Delta Dental Foundation's Rethink Your Drink: Water's Cool at School program. The initiative, totaling nearly \$80,000 in giving in 2019, selects schools based on criteria including number of children served, the number of children receiving free and reduced lunch, and the age and state of their current water fountain(s).

"Having a water bottle station is a great way for us to support healthy choices for our students. Not only are they able to have water with them at all times, it is encouraging our students to develop a healthy lifestyle and to make water a key part of their day," said Rick Mohrien, Principal of Winget Park Elementary. "Having the station has definitely made our students rethink their drink! I see more and more students carrying water bottles and filling bottles each day, so I know this is making a difference!"

The new water bottle-filling station gives students a healthy alternative to sugary beverages like sodas, sports drinks and juice, all of which are high in sugar. Drinking soda nearly doubles the risk of cavities in children.¹ Drinking water helps combat obesity and increase energy levels and may improve students' cognitive functions at school. Further, if fluoridated, drinking water also plays an important role in preventing cavities.

"Tooth decay is the most common, chronic childhood disease today, and children miss 51 million hours of school every year in the U.S. due dental issues," said Curt Ladig, president and CEO of Delta Dental of North Carolina. "The Delta Dental Foundation's Rethink Your Drink: Water's Cool at School program will

help provide access to drinking water in schools across our state, which in turn can help children make healthier choices and show up for school ready to learn."

The Delta Dental Foundation focuses on ensuring that children and adults in North Carolina receive high quality oral health education and dental care. The Delta Dental Foundation's programs for children in North Carolina include the Smiles for Kids grant program and the Rethink Your Drink: Water's Cool at School program. To date, nearly \$300,000 was awarded to programs across the state, ensuring that more than 200,000 children and their families received access to oral health care or education.
